## DECARBONISATION DIALOGUE

New initiatives for a net-zero future

Dear Madam or Sir,

The German Embassy in Tokyo, the Environmental Institute for Global Environmental Strategies and Climate Transparency cordially invite you to the Decarbonisation Dialogue.

The COP26 climate summit in Glasgow ended with a compromise to phase down coal power. A complete phase-out agreement could not be reached on the multi-lateral stage. However, 46 countries (among them Germany) signed the Global Coal to Clean Power Transition Statement to achieve a transition away from unabated coal power generation in the 2030s (major economies) and 2040s (others). In addition, new initiatives such as Asian Development Bank's Energy Transition Mechanisms and the Just Energy Transition Partnership among South Africa, European countries and the US were also proposed. These new efforts, together with the ongoing challenge to jump-start the global economy in a COVID 19 world, creates a unique window of opportunity to switch tracks from high to low carbon pathways.

As highly industrialized nations, Japan and Germany are in a position to promote decarbonisation through innovative technologies. Both nations share the need to transition to a low-carbon economy, but also need to stay competitive in a more and more carbon-constrained world. Their support to other nations' decarbonisation efforts through bilateral and multilateral energy partnerships by dialogue, assistance and transfer of policy is therefore a key component for a global low-carbon economy. At the same time, an increase of low-carbon investments will help to balance out the phase-out of foreign investments in coal power all g7 nations have committed to at their last summit in June 2021.

This dialogue will introduce the current status and future perspective of decarbonisation, opening possibilities for common net-zero pathways.
